



Sensational Sondheim: Part 2 *with* Marc Courtade Friday, November 6 @ 1 pm

This talk continues to explore the works of Stephen Sondheim, showcasing his more mature works: *Company, Follies, A Little Night Music, Sweeney Todd, Pacific Overtures, Sunday in the Park with George, Into the Woods, Assassins,* and *Road Show.*

Bill Graham and the Rock & Roll Revolution with the New-York Historical Society Thursday, November 19 @ 7 pm

Get ready to rock! Dive into the life and times of Bill Graham, the legendary music impresario behind the biggest names in rock & roll—including the **Grateful Dead**, **Jimi Hendrix**, **Santana**, and **the Rolling Stones**. This interactive virtual presentation tells the thrilling story of how a child refugee from Nazi Germany became one of the most influential concert promoters of all time. Explore psychedelic posters, oral history audio clips, and rare backstage photographs with a New-York Historical Society docent.

The Hollywood Star System: Mary Pickford to Meryl Streep Tuesday, December 1 @ 7 pm • *with* Brian Rose

For more than a century, Hollywood has relied on star power as the most reliable way to draw an audience. From the early days of silent movies, when Mary Pickford was able to command \$10,000 a week to modern times, when actors like Tom Cruise and Tom Hanks are guaranteed \$20 million (or more) a picture, the film studios have recognized the crucial role stars play at the box office. This presentation will look at the history of movie stardom—how originally film actors weren't even identified by name, how Mary Pickford became *America's Sweetheart* and the first real film star, how Hollywood studios manufactured stars like Judy Garland, Mickey Rooney, and Lana Turner during its Golden Age, how the star system changed once television came on the scene, and how actors like Jack Nicholson, Meryl Streep, and Denzel Washington ushered in a new definition of stardom during the last few decades.

Akira Kurosawa: Samurai of the Cinema with film historian, Max Alvarez Friday, December 11 @ 2 pm

For 50 years, Japan's premier director Akira Kurosawa (1910-1998) reigned supreme as a master of world cinema. The genius of Kurosawa spanned 31 unforgettable films (many featuring the great actor **Toshiro Mifune**), including **Rashomon** (1950), **Seven Samurai** (1954), **Yojimbo** (1961), **Throne of Blood** (1957), **Ran** (1985), and **Kagemusha** (1980). Join film historian Max Alvarez for this sweeping tribute to the life and art of the great Japanese storyteller and stylist.

Art & History Lectures

Interactive LIVE Virtual Tour at the Tenement Museum The Moore Family Apartment Thursday, November 5 @ 6:30 pm

This time slot is due to changing light conditions necessary to record inside the tenement building. The program starts promptly at 6:30 pm.

A 60-minute interactive virtual visit to the **Tenement Museum**, with a Tenement Museum Educator. You'll go inside 97 Orchard Street and through the history of a family who lived there. You'll learn about daily life in the past, see the spaces, meet the people, and get to ask questions about the history. The Moore Family story features an Irish American family in the 1860s, and explores work, belonging, and identity in a changing city.

Picasso and the Masters *with* Professor Thomas Germano Thursday, November 12 @ 1 pm

Picasso was heavily influenced by historical artists, among them Velazquez, Goya, El Greco, Rembrandt, Poussin, Delacroix and Titian, as well as modern artists, Manet, Degas, Lautrec, Van Gogh, Gauguin, Renoir, and Cezanne. Picasso had two fundamentally different ways of responding to the masters. The first was to seamlessly assimilate the subject matter into his own art: poses, compositions, colors, and treatment of pictorial space he found in other works. The second was a complement to the masterworks. In both ways, Picasso's abstract modernism reaffirmed his own secure placement in the history of art, among the masters.

A New Light on Tiffany *with* the New-York Historical Society Wednesday, December 9 @ 2 pm

Explore the **New-York Historical Society's** collection of Tiffany lamps—one of the world's largest and most encyclopedic—and the intricate techniques that created them with this interactive virtual presentation. View masterpieces of this elegant American art form and hear the personal stories of head designer **Clara Driscoll** and her team of **Tiffany Girls**, whose contributions were nearly forgotten by history.

LIVE Christina Baker Kline • Monday, November 9 @ 7 pm A #1 New York Times bestselling author of eight novels, including *The Exiles, Orphan Train,* and *A Piece of the World*, Christina Baker Kline is published in 40 countries. Her novels have received the New England Prize for Fiction, the Maine Literary Award, and a Barnes & Noble Discover Award, among other prizes, and have been chosen by hundreds of communities, universities and schools as One Book, One Read selections. Her essays, articles, and reviews have appeared in publications such as *The New York Times* and *The NYT Book Review, The Boston Globe, The San Francisco Chronicle, LitHub, Psychology Today,* and *Salon*.

LIVE Finola Austin • Tuesday, November 17 @ 7 pm

Finola Austin was born in Gravesend, England to a Northern Irish father and an English/Welsh mother. When she was five, her family moved to Northern Ireland. Finola spent her childhood telling stories to her long-suffering younger sister and reading all the books she could get her hands on. Her high school was Methodist College Belfast, which she chose because it had a drama studio and Latin lessons.

Finola returned to England for university and graduated with a BA in Classics & English from Merton College, Oxford, followed by an MSt in English Literature, from Corpus Christi College, Oxford. Her interest in literature continued beyond her academic studies and she founded the *Secret Victorianist*, an award-winning blog dedicated to nineteenthcentury literature and culture. Her first novel, *Brontë's Mistress*, was released by Atria Books in August 2020.

LIVE Stuart Turton • Monday, December 7 @ 2 pm

Stuart Turton is an English internationally bestselling author and journalist. His debut novel, *The 7 ½ Deaths of Evelyn Hardcastle* won the First Novel Award at the 2018 Costa Book Awards and has been sold in 28 languages. Since publication, it has sold over 200,000 copies in the UK. His new book *The Devil and the Dark Water* is the story of a murder on the high seas, a detective duo, and a demon who may or may not exist...

It's 1634 and Samuel Pipps, the world's greatest detective, is being transported to Amsterdam to be executed for a crime he may, or may not, have committed. Travelling with him is his loyal bodyguard Arent Hayes, who is determined to prove his friend innocent.

No sooner are they out to sea than devilry begins to blight the voyage, and then three passengers are marked for death, including Samuel. Could a demon be responsible for their misfortunes? With Pipps imprisoned, only Arent can solve a mystery connecting every passenger onboard. A mystery that stretches back into their past and now threatens to sink the ship.

The Nightworkers is an electrifying debut crime novel about a Brooklyn family of money launderers thrown into chaos when a runner ends up dead and a bag of dirty money goes missing.

Brian Selfon has worked in criminal justice for nearly twenty years, more than fifteen of them with law enforcement agencies in New York. As the Chief Investigative Analyst for the Brooklyn District Attorney's Office, he handled cases ranging from money laundering to first-degree murder. Brian now lives with his family in Seattle, where he works as a public defense investigator. **The Nightworkers** is his debut novel.
